The workshop outcomes will be documented by the facilitators, for publication on the EMS Association website as a resource for industry practitioners. The outcomes may also form the basis for a future paper on the topic.

8:30am	Barwon Water Black Rock Recycling Plant, Connewarre Barwon Water (Barwon Region Water Corporation) is Victoria's largest regional urban water corporation, providing world class water, sewerage and recycled water services to more than 275,000 people across 8100 square kilometres. The Black Rock Recycled Water Plant is Geelong's major sewage treatment and recycled water facility. The tour of the plant with Coordinator David Geare will look at biosolids, recycled water, wind generation, landscaping (tree planting) and work with local environmental groups.

1:15pm	Arrive Toyota Plant Toyota builds two models - Camry and Aurion - in Australia for local and overseas markets. In 2008 the plant at Altona manufactured a record 141,467 vehicles and 114,752 engines. Toyota Australia's manufacturing plant has been certified against the international environmental management standard ISO 14001 since 1998 and in March 2009 an annual surveillance audit was conducted to ensure compliance with ISO 14001. The Toyota Parts Centre in Sydney was certified to ISO 14001 in February 2008. Roll-out across Toyota's non-production sites continued in 2008/09. Toyota Australia's corporate headquarters and its vehicle servicing garage, Company Fleet Altona, achieved ISO 14001 certification in April 2009. Dedicated on-site Toyota EMS teams drive environmental improvement by sharing information with their colleagues. TEMS members at CHQ and Company Fleet meet on a monthly basis to discuss environmental performance indicators, improvement projects, compliance and management of environmental risks. To ensure that the TEMS was functional, monthly environmental internal audits were conducted by the Environment Policy Group and TEMS members to highlight any issues and improvement activities. TEMS is an internal company brand with a logo, signage and an intranet (TEMS and Me) to raise environmental awareness among Toyota Australia staff. The intranet provides how-to guides for recycling, saving energy and water and includes a link to submit suggestions and links to government energy and water-saving sites.
